

## Information for Contributors

The African Development Bank's *Working Paper Series* is interested in publishing policy-oriented non-technical papers on African development issues. The main purpose of the *Working Paper Series* is to disseminate findings of work in progress, to encourage the exchange of ideas about development issues across the African continent, and to enhance the process of knowledge generation by forging a feedback mechanism between research and field experiences. The Series aims at sharing such findings and ideas without requiring them to be fully polished. Papers submitted are therefore encouraged to be considered elsewhere for a more formal publication. The publication of a Working Paper is offered to all professionals as long as the topic of the paper is relevant to Africa's development and its quality measures up to the standard of the Series. Manuscripts, which are deemed suitable, will be peer-reviewed, whereby peers normally make their decision within one month after the receipt of the manuscript.

### I. Submission of manuscripts

Manuscripts for consideration for the *Working Paper Series* should be submitted electronically (as MS Word documents) to Mr. Albert Mafusire ([a.mafusire@afdb.org](mailto:a.mafusire@afdb.org)), whereby manuscripts should be single-spaced throughout and be within the range of 8 000 to 10 000 words. Manuscripts of more than 12 000 words will be returned without comments. There are neither submission fees nor page charges.

### II. General preparation of manuscripts

The first page of the manuscript needs to include (a) the paper's title, (b) the author's name, title, current address, telephone, fax numbers, and e-mail address, and (c) an English as well as a French abstract of 150 to 200 words, the keywords and JEL classification. Excluding the abstract, papers may be submitted in either English or French. No more than three levels of headings should be used. Footnotes are to be avoided and should take the form of endnotes listed prior to the references. Quotes should be in quotation marks and if longer than 25 words indented, and referenced including the page number of the source. Simple tables can be in MS Word, extensive tables should be provided as separate MS Excel files. Copyrights remain with the author(s).

### III. Style of references

The reference style needs to follow the following examples:

**a) References to journal articles:** Lucas, Robert E. Jr. (1988) 'On the Mechanics of Economic Development', *Journal of Monetary Economics*, Vol. 22, No. 1, pp. 3-42.

**b) References to articles in books:** Bourguignon, Francois and Luiz A. Pereira da Silva (2003) 'Conclusion: Where to Go from Here?', in François Bourguignon and Luiz A. Pereira da Silva (eds) *The Impact of Economic Policies on Poverty and Income Distribution: Evaluation Techniques and Tools*, Washington, D.C. and New York: World Bank and Oxford University Press: 339-50.

**c) References to monographs/books:** Taylor, Lance (2004) *Reconstructing Macroeconomics*, Cambridge: Harvard University Press.

**d) References to unpublished items:** Rodrik, Dani (2004) 'Rethinking Growth Policies in the Developing World', Draft of the Luca d'Agliano Lecture delivered on October 8, 2004, in Torino, Italy. Note: if possible, include website where paper is available.
